

BTEO Highlights

Year ending May 2025



A Year of Transitions

For 10 years, Belonging to Each Other (BTEO) has helped our homeless Falmouth neighbors on their journey to stable housing. We provide a temporary home and work with our residents to create/ strengthen a support system they will take to their new home. We do this with a small staff and 130+ volunteers. Our programs include:

- **A transformative seasonal housing program** for unhoused individuals who agree to address their personal barriers to stable housing. Last November through May we provided 31 people 2181 nights in a welcoming and comfortable environment. This no-cost program includes:
 - Transportation by volunteers to work and program-related trips.
 - Shared laundry, internet and technology.
 - · All utilities.
 - Shared, furnished rooms with linens.
- Year-round supportive service led by our clinical director and staff. Priority goes to people in and alumni of our housing program. When funding is available, we extend this incommunity assistance to other Falmouth-connected people who call us. Last year 82 people were helped.
- A Falmouth emergency shelter collaboration with nonprofit, religious and municipal partners. People living outdoors or in inhumane conditions spend freezing days and nights in a motel until the weather improves. BTEO plugs a hole in this collaboration by providing a home-style dinner and shelf-stable meal packs. BTEO partners with the Falmouth Service Center to prepare the dinners and source food for the packs. Last year our deliveries fed 66 people on 101 dangerous weather days.

The theme for this Impact Report is "Transitions". You can read and hear about transitions by 3 former residents. You can see operational transitions - the new uses for the former Flynn house, which many of you helped BTEO purchase in 2024. And transitions to sustain BTEO in the future.

As we always have, BTEO will focus on the state of homelessness in our town. We are identifying gaps and working with others locally and on Cape so together we can end homelessness in Falmouth.

We are funded almost exclusively by donations - large and small - individuals, local businesses, and regional foundations. We appreciate and are grateful for all the help and collaborations that happen here in Falmouth. Thank you for checking us out.

2025-2026 Transitions in BTEO Space and Programming

The BTEO transitional housing program opened for its 11th season on October 29th. This year we have capacity for up to 11 men and 7 women. Zammer House (the former Flynn House) will serve as the home for our men's program for the first time. Because of its larger size and increased number of bedrooms, we have greater capacity to support more people than we have in the past.

This year, we continue to see an increase in the number of older Falmouth neighbors who have been displaced - 50% of our residents are over the age of 60. The ages of applicants range in age from 23-81. We are also seeing an increase in the number of people who are disabled - 81 % of our residents this year have a disability.

From the moment residents enter our houses, our case managers, Teri St. Pierre, Danielle Alexandrov and Tim Hallenbeck, meet them where they are at. They work quickly to identify each resident's housing goals, identify potential financial resources, collect missing documentation needed for their housing search and establish community connections that will last beyond their stay with BTEO. In addition to our care team, we have two dedicated volunteer house coordinators, Tina Rood and David Sutkowy, as well as the many amazing volunteers who support our houses every week.

Alumni Transitions: Highlights

BTEO's residential program facilitated important personal transitions for our residents. A short video highlights 3 individuals - one of our youngest to one of our oldest, and a mom of 4 who worked all winter to be reunited with her children. They faced family rejection, the death of a spouse, and eviction through no fault of their own. After much hard work, all 3 moved into safe, affordable and permanent housing within 6 months.

Working Together to End Homelessness

With the end of the pandemic, BTEO has opened our doors wide to create new and important working relationships with local community organizations and invite BTEO volunteers into the houses to provide important skills training and community-building opportunities.

BTEO knows that we cannot do it alone, and so we collaborate with local nonprofits and licensed clinicians to provide therapeutic groups in both houses. Falmouth's Human Services Department, a local licensed therapist and Independence House provide groups to build healthy relationship skills, positive self-esteem and inner strength.

In addition, our case managers work in partnership with staff and case managers at the Falmouth Housing Authority, Falmouth Service Center, Vinfen, Housing Assistance Corp, Duffy Health Center, Fairwinds Club House, Veterans service organizations, Relief Home Health Services, the Falmouth Police Department, and our local St. Vincent de Paul.

Activation

- ✓ 10am Duffy Health Center reviews weather reports and notifies BTEO and Homeless Outreach Workers that the Emergency Shelter Program is open due to weather (90+ days/ season).
- ✓ 10am-4pm Outreach Workers find and notify people living outdoors. BTEO is notified of the number expected in motel shelters.
- ✓ 5pm BTEO volunteers gather dinners, meal packs, and welcome packs from the Hub and deliver to motel shelters.



Our Strategic Plan

BTEO is unified behind a vision that, working together, our community can end homelessness in Falmouth.

To accomplish BTEO's part of this vision, our Board has articulated the following 4 goals:



GOAL: OPTIMIZE HOUSING AND SUPPORT PROGRAMS

- Purchased the former Flynn House securing a home for our programs.
- Volunteer coordinator hired number of volunteers grows from 80 to 130+.
- Expanded robust program, therapeutic groups, tenant readiness and more.



GOAL: RAISE PUBLIC AWARENESS

- We seek opportunities to share what we've learned from our close and continuous work with people experiencing homelessness.
- We created a resource guide helpful to unhoused people in Falmouth, distributed widely.
- Appeared on radio and FCTV; are frequent commentators to municipal and regional orgs.



GOAL: STRENGTHEN OUR NONPROFIT TO ENSURE SUSTAINABILITY AND EFFICIENCY

- Technology upgrades improving communication among applicants, residents, staff, donors and volunteers.
- New office space hosts hybrid collaborations within BTEO and with community partners.
- Board expansion adds voices and strategic strength.



GOAL: LEVERAGE AND MAXIMIZE OUR UNIQUE POSITION

- By staying local and being out in the community we know what's happening and connect people to resources
- We don't need to brand everything BTEO does, preferring to draw people together to achieve a common goal.


BTEO's Finances as of May 31st 2025

BTEO's fundraising efforts generated sufficient cash flow to cover our operating expenses for the most recent fiscal year. Our

fundraising activities reflect broad-based community support, with 54% coming from 480 individual donors, 35% from grants, and 11% from corporate and other organizations. We were able to accomplish this without receiving any government funds.


